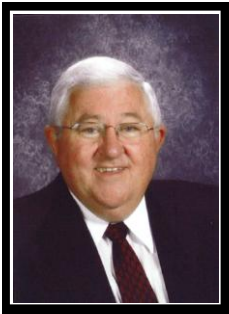
We will be praying with you about attending Calvary. If I can help you in any way, please feel free to call me. May the Lord bless you.

General Information

Purpose

The Purposes of Calvary Baptist Bible College are:

- First and foremost, to glorify God in everything we do.
- To provide the academic and practical aspects of preparing men for the gospel ministry: preaching the Word, serving as pastors, missionaries, youth pastors, evangelists, or other full-time ministries;
- To train men to accurately handle the Word of God, to be zealous in the preaching of it, as true servants of our Lord Jesus Christ;
- To instill in the hearts of our students a love for Christ, His Word, His Church, His people, and the souls of lost people;
- To prepare students to leave this institution to build fundamental, independent, separated, soul winning Baptist churches;
- To develop the devotional life of our students so they can maintain a close walk with the Lord, whom they have been called to serve.

Philosophy

We are committed to the belief that it is vital for experienced pastors, missionaries, and Christian educators to train God-called men for the ministry. Teaching is much more than dispensing facts; it is pouring one life into another. We endeavor to fill our faculty with seasoned preachers of the Bible. We will also seek to fill our chapel pulpit with men who will inform the mind, stir the heart, and challenge the will. We plan to keep our chapels “hot.” We also believe that the spiritual life of a man is most important as he prepares himself for the ministry. We will stress the importance of private and personal aspects of our student’s lives. We will encourage each student to maintain a close relationship to the Lord through daily prayer and personal Bible study.

We also believe a strong academic program is necessary to properly prepare men for the ministry. We will not only teach the what of the ministry, but also the reasons and the processes. The discipline of hard study is vital to a students’ preparation.

We are also convinced that no education is complete without practical involvement in a local church. This is a great part of the overall training of a man for the gospel ministry. We emphasize the local church as God’s plan for this age. Our school is therefore a ministry of and under the umbrella of Calvary Baptist Church. Nothing can substitute for the local church. Students already established in local churches in the area are encouraged to be faithful to support their pastor and serve in their own local churches. Other students can avail themselves of the many opportunities of service at Calvary

(approximately eight hundred in Sunday morning attendance), rest home, jail, and bus ministries, and other ministries for children, teens, and adults.

Calvary does not accept the philosophy, position, or practice of the National Council of Churches, New Evangelicalism, Hyper-Calvinism, the Charismatic movement or other aspects of ecumenicalism.

Doctrinal Statement

This statement of faith is found in the Constitution of Calvary Baptist Church of King.

Section 1: Doctrine of the Bible

We believe the Bible to be verbally (every word) and plenary (complete) inspired Word of God in the original autographs; that all portions of Scripture are equally inspired and contain no contradictions (2Tim.3:16; 2Peter 1:20,21). God's word is to be the only rule of faith and practice for the believer in Jesus Christ; and that the Canon, the sixty-six books of the Bible, is complete. We further believe that God has supernaturally and providentially preserved His inspired word for every generation (Psalm 12:6,7).

- A. By Inspiration we mean that the books of the Bible were written by holy men of God as they were moved by the Holy Ghost in such a definite way that their writings were supernaturally and verbally inspired and free from error, as no other writings have ever been or ever will be. This was a one time event in which God once for all delivered His truth to the church (Jude v.3).
- B. By providentially preservation we mean that God through the ages has, in His divine providence, preserved the very words He inspired. We further believe that the Hebrew Old Testament text, as found in the Traditional Masoretic Text, and the Greek New Testament text, as found in the Textus Receptus, are the true texts of Scripture and therefore are the complete, preserved, inerrant, infallible Word of God.
- C. We therefore believe that the King James Version is an accurate and faithful translation of the original manuscripts and constitutes the preserved, inspired, inerrant, infallible Word of God for the English speaking people of the world. The King James Version of the Bible is the only translation used by Calvary Baptist Church and Calvary Baptist Bible College and Seminary.

Section 2: Doctrine of God

We believe that the Godhead eternally exists in three Persons—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; and that these three are one God, having precisely the same nature, attributes and perfections; and are worthy of precisely the same homage, confidence and obedience. Genesis 1:1; Genesis 1:25; John 1:1; John 14:16, 17; I Timothy 3:16

Section 3: Doctrine of Jesus Christ

We believe in the essential deity and virgin birth of our Lord Jesus Christ; that He was begotten by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary not having human father, and is true God and true man; that He is man's only hope of salvation from sin, being the only mediator between God and man; that He died, was buried, and rose again the third day for our sins according to the Scriptures; that His return for His Church, the Body of Christ, which He will take with Himself into heaven is imminent; and that He will come to this earth to set up His millennial reign. Isaiah 7:14; Luke 1:35; John 1:1-4; John 10:30; John 14:6; I Timothy 2:5, 6; I Thessalonians 4:13-18; Revelation 20:4-6.

Section 4: Doctrine of the Holy Spirit

We believe the Holy Spirit to be co-equal with the Father and with the Son. He is a Person. He came to this earth as the fulfillment of Christ's promise. He convicts, regenerates, indwells, seals, fills, empowers, and guides the believer. John 16:7-13; John 3:3-5; Acts 1:8; I Corinthians 6:19; Ephesians 1:13, 14; Ephesians 5:18

Section 5: Doctrine of Man

We believe that God created man in His own image and that man sinned and thereby incurred not only physical death but also spiritual death which is conscious and eternal separation from God. We believe that all men are born with a sinful nature, evidenced by sinful acts; that man is totally depraved (every aspect of man has been affected by sin) and that if he is not born again, he is eternally lost. Genesis 1:26, 27; Psalm 51:5; Jeremiah 17:9; Luke 16:23; Revelation 21:8; Romans 3:10-23; Romans 5:12; I Corinthians 15:21, 22; Revelation 20:11-15, Revelation 21:8.

Section 6: Doctrine of Human Sexuality

We believe that God has commanded that no intimate sexual activity should be engaged in outside of a marriage between a man and a woman. We believe that any form of homosexuality, lesbianism, bisexuality, bestiality, incest, fornication, adultery, and pornography are sinful perversions of God's gift of sex. Genesis 2:24, 19:5, 13, 26:8-9, Leviticus 18:1-30; Romans 1:26-29; I Corinthians 5:1, 6:9; I Thessalonians 4:1-8; Hebrews 13:4

Section 7: Doctrine of Marriage

We believe that God created marriage as a divine institution between one man and one woman for life. God hates divorce and intends marriage to last until one of the spouses dies. Therefore, we never promote divorce as a solution to marital problems. We also believe God's forgiveness includes all sins, including those who violate God's permanence of marriage. Even though such forgiven people can be used of the Lord and

serve in many areas of the church, we do believe the Scriptures prohibit them from being considered for the offices of pastor or deacon. Malachi 2:14-17; Matthew 19:3-12; Romans 7:1-3; I Timothy 3:2,12; Titus 1:6

Section 8: Doctrine of Human Life

We believe that human life begins at conception and that the unborn child is a living human being. We believe that the unjustified, unexcused taking of human life such as abortion, euthanasia, and infanticide is murder. We reject any teaching that abortions of pregnancies due to rape, incest, birth defects, gender selection, population control or the mental well being of the mother are acceptable, unless a choice between the life of the mother and the life of the child is at stake. Job 3:16; Psalms 51:1-5, 139:14-16; Isaiah 44:24; 49:1,5; Jeremiah 1:5, 20:15-18; Luke 1:44

Section 9: Doctrine of Salvation

We believe that a person is saved when he repents of his sin and exercises faith by accepting Jesus Christ as his personal Savior. The believer is kept by the power of God and is eternally secure in Christ.

We believe that the scope of salvation includes forgiveness of all our sins past, present, and future: a perfect standing before God as in Jesus Christ: and the changing of our earthly body to be conformed like unto the body of our Lord at His return for His own.

We believe that the attitude either of reconciliation or enmity toward God is eternally fixed at death. We further believe that there is an appointed day for the judgment of the wicked when they will be cast into the Lake of Fire, there to remain in everlasting conscious punishment and torment. John 1:12; John 5:24; John 10:28, 29; Romans 6:23; II Corinthians 5:21; Ephesians 2:8, 10; I John 5:17; Romans 8:19-23; I John 3:2; II Thessalonians 1:7-9; Hebrews 9:27; II Peter 2:8, 9; Revelation 20:12-15; Revelation 21:8

Section 10: Doctrine of the Church

We believe that the local church is composed of a local group of believers that is autonomous, self-governing, and has no ecclesiastical organization in authority over it. They have for their officers: pastors, deacons and such other leaders as God has given special gifts to render as a ministry to the church. Believers who are baptized by immersion. Believers who are organized. Believers who observe the ordinances of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Believers who meet regularly for fellowship, worship, and Bible study. Believers who carry out the Great Commission. 1 Corinthians 12:13; Acts 2; I Thessalonians 4:13-18; I Corinthians 16:19; Acts 2:41; 1 Corinthians 12;

Hebrews 10:25; I Corinthians 11:23, 24; Matthew. 28:18-20

Section 11: Doctrine of Satan and Fallen Angels

We believe that Satan is a person. He was created perfect, but sinned and became the arch enemy of God and His creation. He is the chief adversary of God's children. He seeks to keep man from the Lord, and when he cannot succeed in this, he seeks to weaken the testimony of Christians. He has at his command a great host of fallen angels and demons to carry out his purposes. He is not omnipotent and can be overcome by the power of God. His doom is sealed in the Lake of Fire forever and forever. Ezekiel 28:12-19; Isaiah.14:12-14; Revelation 12:10; Revelation 20:10.

Section 12: Doctrine of Last Things

We believe there will be a resurrection of all, first the just at the coming of Jesus Christ and finally the unjust after the millennium. The saints are raised to be forever with the Lord, and the unsaved will be confined for eternity in the Lake of Fire. We believe in the "Blessed Hope" (Titus 2:13) which is the personal, bodily, pretribulational, premillennial, and imminent return of our Lord and Savior for His Church at the rapture and His later return to the earth in power and glory with His saints to set up His Kingdom (the millennium). John 14:1-3; Acts 1:9-11, Acts 24:15; I Corinthians. 15:3-20; Philippians 3:20; I Thessalonians 4:13-18, I John 2:1-2, Revelations 20: 1-15, Revelations 21:8.

Past History

Pastor Roger Baker became pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in March of 1976. The church was meeting in a store-front building at that time. As God began to bless, the church founded Calvary Christian School in 1982. Pastor Baker has always been a firm believer in Christian education. His burden to begin a Bible College where men could train for the gospel ministry grew. He founded the college in 1988, recognizing a need for an educational facility where Christian men, called of God to preach, could train to be servants of God.

Location

Calvary Baptist Bible College is located just thirteen miles north of Winston-Salem in the city of King. King has enjoyed a steady growth over the past few decades. King is part of a beautiful area, near Pilot Mountain Knob, Sauratown Mountain and Hanging Rock. We are located just off Highway 52, Exit 123, on Main Street. The Church and Bible College are located less than a mile on the left.

Facilities

The Lord has blessed Calvary Baptist with facilities to meet the needs of the church family, the school family, and our college family. We are located on fourteen acres of prime property on Main Street.

Student Life



Spiritual Life

We are committed to the spiritual growth of each of our students and dedicated to providing an atmosphere conducive to the development of strong Christian character.

Every class begins with prayer.

We have chapels that are not just another class, where preachers and evangelists come to challenge and stir our souls. We strive to have preachers who represent what we are trying to do in the life of our students. Attendance at chapel is mandatory for all students. A strong chapel gives a proper balance in the midst of academic training.

Church attendance is not optional. All students moving into the area to attend Calvary are required to attend Calvary Baptist Church. Students already living in the area and established in a local church should remain in that local church, working to support their pastor and church. A student attending Calvary Baptist Church may request permission during his Junior or Senior year to work with another local church provided it is a salaried position. The final decision will be at the discretion of the administration. There may be exceptions to the above, at the discretion of the administration.

Christian Service

Christian Service is a major part of our college. Each student is required to be involved in the ministry of a local church. A weekly soul winning activity is expected of each student. The student who has no desire to win lost sinners to Christ should not apply for admission if they are not willing to participate in this vital part of the overall educational program.

You will need to specify one or two particular ministries you will be using as your Christian service per semester. You may list all that you do, but you should do one of the two listed every week.

You will need to complete your report every Thursday. For each report missing at the end of the semester, five points will be taken off your practicum grade for the semester. This grade will affect your grade point average, plus you must have these practicum credits in order to graduate. Your Christian Service notebook must remain in the college office.

You must satisfy the requirements for preaching. If you do not, three points will be taken off the semester practicum grade for each time you are short of the required number of preaching opportunities. Since we are a preacher's school, students will be required to preach as a part of their practicum grade each semester. The college will help any students needing an opportunity to preach through rest homes, jails, etc. The following is expected of our students:

Freshmen: Preach a minimum of two sermons per semester.

Sophomores: Preach a minimum of three sermons per semester.

Juniors: Preach a minimum of four sermons per semester.

Seniors: Preach a minimum of five sermons per semester.

It will be required that every student go on soul-winning visitation of some kind every week for a minimum of one hour. Each week you fail to do this will count off three (3) points of your final practicum grade. However, there will be two (2) excused weeks per semester. For example, if you turn in reports for sixteen weeks during the semester, you must have been involved in soul-winning visitation at least fourteen weeks so as not to lose points off your semester grade. We realize revival services, sickness, etc. may hinder you from going on visitation.

Standard of Conduct

Calvary is committed to the highest standards of Christian conduct. We believe that the Bible, God's infallible Word, provides the basis for that conduct. Salvation by faith in Christ is the initial step in the Christian life, this is followed by spiritual growth into the image of Christ, which is a work of the Holy Spirit (Rom. 8:29; 2 Cor. 3:18). This results in a life consecrated unto the Lord and separated from the world.

God's glory must be of the utmost importance to the true servant of Jesus Christ. Our students must endeavor to avoid practices which cause the loss of sensitivity to the

spiritual needs of the world and their own personal walk with the Lord. This would include such practices as gambling, dancing, profanity, obscenity, drug abuse, use of tobacco products or alcohol, attendance at movie theaters, adultery, fornication, homosexuality and other forms of worldliness unbecoming to a preacher of the gospel. Our rules are reasonable and necessary for successful Christian living.

Attendance at Calvary is a privilege; therefore, the college reserves the right to refuse admission to, discipline, or dismiss any student whose personal conduct or attitude, in the judgment of the administration, is not consistent with the Christian spirit and standards which we seek to maintain. Counseling is available for any student who desires such. The college office should be contacted for such service.

Employment

Classes are held only two days a week (Tuesday and Thursday) so students have the opportunity to work full days or night shifts if desired. We realize that most students will have to work while in school. We seek to help students find suitable employment while in college. This area has many good employment opportunities. Business men who attend Calvary Baptist Church often employ some of our students. When considering employment, a student should take into account that his calling and his training take priority. Though most students will need to work, a student should plan his work around training, not plan his training around his work. A student must decide what God has called him to do with his life. Everything should fit around God's will for the student. His primary goal is not to make money while in school (though it is a necessary part), but to prepare himself for the ministry to which God has called him. We will be glad to help him get the proper balance.

Marriage

Many of our students are married when they enter college. Many good men have worked hard, provided for a family, been faithful to God, and finished their training for the ministry. It is certainly not an easy task, but God will provide for what He calls you to do. We encourage our married students to cherish and nurture their wives and children—not neglect them. The wife should be a part of the preparation for her husband's calling. The married student is encouraged to involve his wife as much as possible in his training. This is one of the reasons we have a summer cookout for the entire family, just prior to the fall semester, as well as the Spring Banquet for couples.

We do not recommend students marrying during the semester. If a student plans to marry during the Christmas break, he should notify the administration in advance. We work with students who plan to marry in every way possible, but also want the

opportunity to counsel concerning the timing. It is usually very difficult on a new marriage for the student who gets married in the midst of college responsibilities during a semester.

Housing

We do not have housing on our campus at present. We do make every effort to find both married and unmarried students affordable housing in the area. We are glad to assist the students in this area.

Admissions

Requirements

Personal Requirements

- a. Each applicant is required to give testimony of personal salvation in Christ, including growth in grace since their conversion.
- b. Since we are a preacher's college, we only accept male students based on the ThB program due to our Biblical convictions (I Tim. 2:12-14; 3:1-7)
- c. Since we are a Baptist College, students who apply should be in agreement with the doctrinal statement of the college.

High School Requirements

- a. Applicants for admission must have graduated from high school or successfully completed the General Education Development Test (GED).
- b. Students who graduate from a home school program must submit a transcript of course work completed, showing credits and grades earned, and a date of graduation.

Procedures for Admission

- Return the completed application with the \$10.00 application fee. Make certain all information is complete. If you need an application, please call the college to request one (336-983-3728) or write to:

- Three personal references are required before any applicant will be accepted.

One of these should be your pastor.

- A written testimony must be submitted with the application giving a brief sketch of your life, salvation, assurance, and direction in life. Be sure to include your desire for future service.
- Fill out and return the Student Health Certificate (state law).
- Request an official copy of your final high school transcript to be sent directly to our college address. Students must request any college transcripts from a previous college. Request forms are included in the application packet.

Transfer Student

A student who desires to transfer credits from other institutions of higher education must furnish Calvary with an official transcript from each institution attended. If necessary, the student may be required to furnish Calvary with a current catalog from those institutions. Students who qualify for Veteran's benefits must request transcripts from any previous college attended.

Transfer Credit Policies

Courses acceptable for transfer must be similar in content and quality and considered equivalent to the course at Calvary. The time spent in class for such courses will also be a consideration. Only those credits which carry a minimum grade of **C** or its equivalent will be transferred. As a rule, correspondence credits are not acceptable for a degree (there are exceptions). If the course credits come from a recognized school and our administration determines that the courses fit our standard of quality at Calvary, credits may be transferred. Each student's situation will be reviewed individually, yet equitably, to determine transferable credits.

Academic Information

Academic Information

It is our desire at Calvary Baptist Bible College to be a place where men who have been called into the Gospel ministry can receive a quality academic education. We believe the overall course of study will provide an excellent basis for future ministry. At present, the courses of study are intended to be directed exclusively toward men who are either called to or already involved in the ministry as pastors, missionaries, evangelists, youth directors, and other recognized leadership ministries that demand a God called man.

The degree program of study offered by Calvary Baptist Bible College has been found to be exempt from the requirement of licensure by the University of North Carolina under provisions of North Carolina General Statutes Section (G. S.) 116-15 (d) for exemption from licensure with respect to religious education. Exemption for licensure is not based upon any assessment of program quality under established licensing standards.

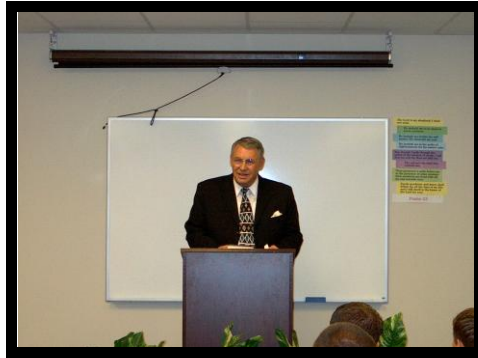
Graduation Requirements

- Shall have completed a minimum of 30 hours credit at Calvary (transfer students must comply with this rule regardless of the number of hours already taken at previous colleges).
- Shall have received a decision of eligibility for graduation from the faculty.
- Shall have completed all the requirements of the pursued course by the day of graduation and must have fulfilled all financial obligations to Calvary Baptist Bible College.
- Shall have maintained an overall grade point average of at least 2.00, having passed all required courses in the program of study in which the degree is given (a total of 128 credit hours).
- Shall have satisfactorily completed the Christian service practicum for each semester he is enrolled at Calvary.
- Shall have given evidence of high Christian character and conduct in accordance with Calvary's standards.
- Shall be in essential agreement with the doctrinal statement of the college.

Student Classification

Students are classified according to their progress toward earning a degree. Students are also classified according to the number of credit hours taken during a semester.

- Freshman— one who has completed 1 to 28 credit hours.
- Sophomore— one who has completed 29-60 credit hours.
- Junior— one who has completed 61-96 credit hours.
- Senior— one who has more than 96 hours and has a reasonable prospect of graduation during the college term then in progress.

A full-time-student is one who is pursuing a degree and is enrolled for twelve or more credit hours. A part-time student is one who is pursuing a degree and is enrolled for eleven or fewer credit hours.

Unit of Credit

The unit of credit is the semester hour. A semester hour is one 50 minute period of instruction per week for a minimum of 16 weeks per semester.

Grading System

The 4.0 system of academic credit is used. To figure the grade point average, divide the number of semester hours of credit attempted into the number of grade points received. A three hour class with an A would earn twelve grade points. Dividing three into twelve would give you a 4.0 grade point average.

Scholastic Honors

Dean's List

The names of full-time students who have completed all course work and have earned a grade point average of 3.3 or higher will be placed on the Dean's list at the end of each semester (Rom. 13:7).

Honor Graduates

At commencement, honors are given on the following basis to students who have maintained a high academic grade point average according to the following scale:

Attendance

Students are to attend classes on a regular basis. Absences, except for illness or matter of absolute necessity, should be avoided. If a student cannot be faithful in college, how can he ever maintain a ministry when he finishes college? Each absence beyond the permitted limit will result in a reduction in the final grade. *For any class that meets twice a week, you are allowed two cuts without penalty (two points off average for each cut over two.) Absences involving more than 20% of total class time will normally be recorded as a failure, with no credit given. Three tardies will count as one absence. Each student is required to attend chapel if he has a class just before or after chapel or if he is on the property during the time.

Attendance is compulsory for the Spring Banquet and the commencement exercises. Arrangements should be made at work prior to these events to assure the student can attend. Attendance at college graduation is required for all students.

Academic Probation

Student Academic Progress: An acceptable standard of progress is determined by the earned grade point average (GPA) for any one term of attendance and for cumulative work. A student whose cumulative academic average falls below 2.0 (C) will be placed on academic probation.

Probation: Students who are placed on probation are notified that their academic average is below 2.0, that their class load is limited to **twelve credit hours (12)**, and two consecutive terms on probation may result in suspension. Individual situations will be taken into account.

Suspension: For students who are suspended, one academic term must elapse before they are eligible for readmission. A student who is suspended a second time for academic reason is normally not readmitted to the college.

Re-Admission: During the suspension period, the student may apply for readmission, and, if readmitted, will be placed on academic probation. A student who is re-admitted in a subsequent term must have a minimum GPA each term of 2.00 or better.

Adding/Dropping a Course

A student should properly plan for the classes for which he registers. If the need arises to either drop a class or add a class after the semester has begun, the student will need to follow the policy below:

No student can add a class after two weeks of the semester has passed.

No student may drop a class after ten weeks. Courses dropped after this point will be automatically recorded as a failure (**F**).

Any student withdrawing from a class after two weeks, but before ten weeks, must get permission. A grade of either W/P (withdrew passing) or W/F (withdrew failing) will be recorded on the students records. No credit is earned. Please see the schedule for add/drop fees.

Any student dropping a class is responsible to pay tuition for the portion of the class taken per the schedule in this catalog.

Academic Records

Records of progress are kept by the college and furnished to the students at the end of

each semester. A request for academic records to be released to a third party will be permitted once the following information has been received and all financial responsibilities are taken care of:

- A written request signed by the student, including his current home address
- The student's social security number
- The student's dates of attendance
- The date of request
- A proper mailing address of the third party to which the transcript is sent
- The transcript fee must accompany the request.

Library

Calvary Baptist Church, along with Calvary Baptist Bible College and Seminary, maintains a library for the use of its members and students. There will be scheduled library hours to make it convenient for college students to have access to the books needed. Certain books are put on reserve for the college students during a particular semester. Library policies should be followed by all students.

Make-Up and Late Assignments

All assignments should be turned in on the next class period following your absence unless prior arrangements have been made with the teacher. Proctoring of tests that you will need to make up is handled by the college office. Assignments are due on the day the teacher requires them. Late assignments will be penalized as follows: one letter grade will be taken for each class day the assignment is late.

After you reach an **F**, it will be up to the discretion of the teacher if he will accept it beyond this time, but no more than a grade of sixty can be given.

Financial Information

Financial Information

Each student should consider his college account and charges a solemn obligation before the Lord. How a student handles his financial obligations is often a reflection upon his character. Men of God must learn to be good stewards and preserve a good testimony. Tuition and fees paid by the students do not cover all the costs of this institution; part of the cost is provided by Calvary Baptist Church and gifts from other Christian friends. Calvary does not participate in federal grants.

*Registration is considered late if the student does not register on the day of registration. Registration cannot be completed on registration day if the student does not attend the registration orientation, thus considered late registration.

Deferred Payment Plan

Student accounts are due in full at registration. If the account cannot be paid in full at

this time, a payment plan will be offered according to the following terms and conditions. If there are any financial problems, they should be discussed with the administration before registration. We desire to help our students in any way possible. If the student does not have 100% of the tuition bill paid by the day of the final exams, they may take the exam, however, no grade will be recorded on the student transcript until the bill is paid in full.

- 15% of the tuition, plus 100% of all fees and book costs are due on registration day.
- The remaining balance will be due in 3 equal payments due on Oct.1, Nov.1 and Dec.1 (March 1, April 1, May 1 for Spring semesters).

Late payment policy:

A late fee of \$10.00 will be applied to the student's account on October 5 (March 5) if the full amount due on registration day and the payment due on Oct 1 (March 1) have not been made in full. An additional \$10.00 will be applied to the students account on Nov. 5 (April 5) if the equivalent of the full amount due on registration day and the amount equivalent to the two equal payments have not been made in full. An additional \$10.00 will be applied to the students account on December 5 (May 5) if the full amount of all fees, books and tuition have not been paid in full by this date. A \$10.00 fee will be applied each month thereafter if the full amount has not been paid.

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Matriculation Fee — A student will receive a \$50.00 credit on next semester if:

1. He has no more than 3 absences in any class.
2. He attends both the Spring Banquet and Graduation.



Registration Day

Refunds and Adjustments

If it becomes necessary for a student to change his schedule or withdraw from a class or from the college during a semester, refunds and adjustments will be made on the following basis:

- Tuition is refunded based on the date the College is notified in writing by the student of any withdrawals. There is no refund on any fees.
- Students who withdraw after the beginning of classes may be eligible for adjustments to their account according to the following schedule

*After six weeks of classes there will be no refund on tuition

Scholarships

Academic Scholarship

Any student who has graduated as the valedictorian or salutatorian of their high school may be able to apply to receive a \$400 scholarship to be applied to the first two semesters. At least five graduates in the senior class are required. This scholarship is only for full-time students and is not available for transfer students.

Pastor's Scholarship

A \$200 scholarship is available for any freshman student whose pastor feels is of outstanding character. This scholarship is limited to two students per year from the same church. The \$200 will be applied to the first two semesters. A letter from the pastor expressing why he feels the student is worthy of the scholarship is required. It will be awarded at the discretion of the administration.

Evangelistic Scholarship

A \$125 tuition scholarship will be awarded each year to either a Junior or a Senior who has best demonstrated active participation in personal evangelism during his

first years of college. It will not be necessary for the college to give this scholarship if no one excels in this area.

Recruitment Scholarship

A \$400 tuition scholarship is offered to students who are directly responsible for recruiting an individual to Calvary. The recruited student must enroll as a full-time student and complete the semester. This scholarship will be applied to one semester after the recruit completes one semester.

George Law Expository Preaching Award Scholarship

This is a \$250 tuition scholarship that is awarded to a student who has completed both homiletics and expository preaching classes and exhibits excellent quality and ability in the area of expository preaching. This scholarship is awarded periodically and is provided in honor of a friend of the college, Pastor George C. Law.

Dr. John Berry Memorial Scholarship

The Dr. John Berry Memorial Scholarship is awarded to men who demonstrate qualities which exemplify the Lord Jesus Christ while attending Calvary Baptist Bible College in preparation to serve the Lord in fulltime Christian Service. The scholarship is for \$1,200 per year (\$600 per semester). An application form must be obtained from the college office and completed by April 30 for the following year. This scholarship will be applied to the following academic year. The student must be enrolled as a full time student (12 credit hours minimum) and should maintain a high academic rating (minimum of a B average) accompanied with dedication, punctuality, courtesy and responsibility. Any student attending Calvary Baptist Bible College, who has completed one year of studies, is in good standing with the school and his local church, and meets the requirements, is eligible to receive this scholarship.

Coleson and Puckett Scholarship Fund

The Coleson and Puckett Scholarship is awarded to men who demonstrate qualities which exemplify the Lord Jesus Christ while attending Calvary Baptist Bible College in preparation to serve the Lord in fulltime Christian Service. The scholarship is for \$250.00. This award is given by Bro. Billy Marsh's grandfather, Hoover Coleson, and in memory of his great-grandfather, Serle Puckett. Other members of his family donate to this scholarship.

*Note: Additional scholarships are available to members of Calvary Baptist Church.



Veterans Benefits Administration

U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs

The MGIB program provides up to 36 months of education benefits. This benefit may be used for our theology degree program. Generally, benefits are payable for 10 years following your release from active duty. CBBC and Seminary will assist you in filing for these benefits if you are eligible.

CBBC and Seminary is a non-accredited educational institution. This means that we are exempt from the requirements of licensure under the provisions of the North Carolina General Statutes. Due to our non-accreditation status, the Veteran's Administration requires us to convert our semester hours into clock hours. This means that your benefit will be based on the number of clock hours you attend, not the number of semester hours for which you have registered. A monthly attendance record must be kept for each student utilizing the G.I. Bill. This record will reflect the actual number of hours the student spent in each classroom for that particular month.

Our semester clock hours range from 13 to 15 hours per week, depending on the curriculum being offered for that semester. You will need to contact your local Veteran's Administration for payment information.

Course Descriptions

Course Descriptions

Each course in the curriculum is identified by a number comprised of letters and digits. The letters indicate the particular course. The odd numbers are courses which are usually offered in the fall semester. Even numbered courses are usually offered in the spring semester. Not all courses are taken in order. A freshman may not take all first year courses. Courses will be scheduled so a student can graduate on time. Some courses are not allowed until prerequisite courses are taken first. Some courses are taken only when the student is an upper classman. The student will receive counsel concerning this from the administration.

100-199=First Year Courses
200-299=Second Year Courses
300-399=Third Year Courses
400-499=Fourth Year Courses

Bible

BI 101-Old Testament Survey 2 hours

A foundational survey of the Old Testament. The purpose, distinctives, key characters, main events, major doctrines and a broad outline of each book is presented. The arrangement of the Old Testament is studied.

BI202-Pentateuch 4 hours

This course will analyze the first five books of the Bible. The main emphasis will be upon the development of the Jewish nation, though considerable time will be given to the issue of a literal creation. Basic arguments of the critics will be addressed.

BI 301-Historic Books 3 hours

A chapter by chapter study of the historic books of the Old Testament (Joshua-Esther). The leading character and events are studied in the light of historical and practical lessons for Christian living today. Every book will be outlined, major theme given.

BI 302- Poetic Books 3 hours

A study of the poetry division of the Old Testament (Job-Song of Solomon). Style of Hebrew writing will be discussed as well as the structure and themes of each of the

books. The time of their writing and authorship will be correlated within the Old Testament timeline.

BI 401-Prophetic Books I 3 hours

This is a study of Obadiah, Joel, Jonah, Hosea, Amos, Micah, and Isaiah. Special attention will be given to the Messianic passages and also those dealing with eschatology. How these writings fit into the overall timeline of the Bible will be shown.

BI 402-Prophetic Books II 3 hours

This is a study of Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Daniel, Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi. These will be treated in much the same ways as in Prophetic Books I.

BI 104-New Testament Survey 2 hours

A foundational study of the New Testament. The purpose, distinctive, main characters and events, major doctrines and a broad outline of each book will be presented. A good working knowledge of the New Testament should be the result. The arrangement of New Testament books as they relate to a timeline will be discussed.

BI 102-Life of Christ 3 hours

A chronological study of the life of Christ as presented in the four gospels. Special emphasis is given to His birth, baptism, temptation, transfiguration, crucifixion, resurrection and ascension.

BI 201-Pauline Epistles I 3 hours

A historical, doctrinal and practical study of Romans and I and II Corinthians. A careful exposition is made of these three books.

BI 204-Pauline Epistles II 3 hours

A historical, doctrinal and practical study of Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, I and II Thessalonians, I and II Timothy, Titus and Philemon.

BI 303-General Epistles I 3 hours

A historical, doctrinal and practical study of Hebrews, James and I and II Peter.

BI 304-General Epistles II 3 hours

A historical, doctrinal and practical study of I, II, and III John, Jude and Revelation.

BI 105-Prayer and Bible Study Methods 2 hours

Study of the importance of the devotional life of the preacher. Prayer will be discussed

from the Scriptures. Various methods of personal Bible study will be taught. The principles of observation, interpretation, and application will be dealt with. Each student will be required to keep a spiritual journal during the semester.

BI 103-Biblical Interpretation I 2 hours

Hermeneutic principles are established. The grammatical, historical and contextual method is taught. A study of the science of interpretation of the Scriptures. Previously this course was entitled Hermeneutics.

BI 106-Biblical Interpretation II 2 hours

Hermeneutic principles applied. A continuation of Biblical Interpretation I. Dispensationalism is emphasized.

BI 203-Biblical Interpretation III 2 hours

A continuation of Biblical Interpretation II—Dispensationalism

BI 405-Greek I 3 hours

The course is designed to build a basic foundation of New Testament Greek grammar along with the skills of translation. The student should gain a practical knowledge of how to do a word study and how to analyze and explain Scripture passages for teaching and preaching. The Greek verb is stressed during this course, as well as vocabulary building. We use the Textus Receptus Greek text only.

BI 406-Greek II 3 hours

Prerequisite: BI405 A continuation of Greek I, but with an emphasis upon translation.

Theology

TH 201-Systematic Theology I 3 hours

Introduction to theology, bibliology, theology proper and angelology.

TH 202-Systematic Theology II 3 hours

A study of anthropology, harmatiology, and soteriology.

TH 301-Systematic Theology III 3 hours

A study of Christology and pneumatology.

TH 302-Systematic Theology IV 3 hours

A study of ecclesiology and eschatology.

TH 402 - Contemporary Theology 2 hours

An investigational study and criticism of numerous systems of thought such as theological liberalism and neo-orthodoxy. Leading personalities and unscriptural viewpoints of present day systems of error are considered. Included will be a brief survey of the major cults.

Practical Theology

PT 402-Pastoral Theology 2 hours

A study of the life, labors and relationships of a pastor. It will include consideration of the pastor's study life, visitation, conducting weddings and funerals, and administration of the church ordinances. Pastoral ethics and pitfalls will also be discussed.

PT 401-Pastoral Counseling 3 hours

Scriptural principles and practices are presented for helping those who physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually need counsel. The error of integrationism of popular models of counseling will be exposed. Premarital, marital, and youth counseling are considered. A nouthetic approach is used.

PT 102-Personal Evangelism 3 hours

An emphasis on the reasons for methods of personal soul winning. It will stress one on one, confrontational evangelism. The student will learn many key verses and passages used by soul winners. He will learn to answer difficult questions and excuses people often give. More than anything this class seeks to create a burden in the heart of each student to win the lost to Christ. Weekly soul winning is required.

PT 202-Homiletics 3 hours

A study of the preparation and delivery of sermons. This course is designed to instruct in selecting, outlining and gathering materials, as well as the actual delivery of the sermon. Instruction will be given on how to develop and utilize an introduction, conclusion, illustrations, etc. Messages will be prepared and preached in class. Often the sermons will be on video for future analysis.

PT 301-Expository Preaching 3 hours

Prerequisite: PT 202 This course deals with the philosophy, preparation and practical aspects of preaching in an expository manner. Sermons are prepared and preached in class. Videos are utilized so students can actually hear and see themselves deliver an expository sermon.

PT 302-Intimacy in Marriage 2 hours

This course will help equip the preacher to identify emotional and intimate needs which are vital to his own marriage relationship. It will show the preacher how he can identify and resolve past hurt that can damage a marriage. The importance of the preacher's marriage relationship is stressed.

PT 403-Church Administration 3 hours

The duties of the pastor are emphasized as they relate to the

starting and/or administration of a local church. Church constitutions, parliamentary procedure, finances, budgeting, building programs, etc. are discussed.

PT 404-Youth Pastor Practicum 2 hours

Prerequisite: CE 301 and EL 402

An internship program where the student is placed under the supervision of the youth pastor of Calvary Baptist Church or the student's home church youth pastor. A detailed journal of the internship will be kept. A list of questions and projects will be assigned. Evaluation forms will be used as well as extra reading assignments in the area of youth work.

Church Education

CED 402-Church Ministries 2 hours

This course seeks to teach effective and Scriptural means to reach the masses and minister to the needs of people. Such ministries as the bus ministry, elderly ministries, deaf work, jail and prison ministries, radio and senior citizens are covered.

CE 301-Church Education 3 hours

An introduction to the organization and administration of the church's educational program. Special emphasis is given to the Sunday school, Vacation Bible School, Children's Church, camp ministry, nursery, youth ministry, and Christian day school.

CE 302-Teaching Methods 2 hours

A course emphasizing the various techniques in teaching. This course will deal with audio visuals and the training of a teaching staff in a local church.

MU 201-Introduction to Music 2 hours

Introduction to the fundamentals of music are covered. Basic philosophy and principles of church music are examined in the light of Scriptures. The type of music for the evangelistic church is examined and song leading is also taught.

Church History

HI 201-Church History I 2 hours

The first half of the semester will emphasize the beginning of the church as found in the Book of Acts-early days, origin, early development and spread of the church with an emphasis on the men, message and methods used in establishing a New Testament church. The second half of the course will deal with the early centuries after Acts but prior to the Great Reformation Period. Attention will be given to the church leaders as well as to the enemies of the faith and major doctrinal issues of the times.

HI 202-Church History II 3 hours

Prerequisite: HI 201 A continuation of Church History I. It will deal with the more modern period of the church, from the Reformation Period through today.

HI 401-American Christianity 3 hours

A study of the church and denominational growth in America from the first American colony to present day. Emphasis will be given to American Puritanism, the Great Revivals of America, the development of schools, movements including the Fundamentalist Movement of the last 19th and early 20th century. Many leading characters will be discussed.

HI 302-Baptist History 2 hours

Presented in this study is the survey of the Baptist Church from its beginning to the present. The influence on the American culture will be discussed as well. Great leaders of the Baptist movement will be examined.

English

EN 101-English Grammar 3 hours

A study of the English language with an emphasis upon grammar, sentence structure, usage, punctuation and basic writing skills.

EN 102-Research and Writing 2 hours

The course will teach the basics of researching and writing a research paper, using a slightly modified MLA style. The student will learn the importance of good research, the use of different sources, the mechanics of writing and basic grammar. The student will learn how to develop a working outline, a thesis statement, a bibliography, and the logical development of a research paper.

Missions

MI 101-Introduction to Missions 2 hours

This course gives an overview of the New Testament principle of missions as seen in the Book of Acts and Church Epistles. The course examines how these principles are applied and practiced in the church's missionary endeavor today. The student will be given a biblical basis for the development of a strategy for world-evangelism through the local church. The indigenous principle is taught.

MI 401-Missions Practicum 2 hours

Prerequisite: MI 101 An internship placing the prospective missionary student under the supervision of an experienced missionary. A ten day minimum trip to the mission field is required. A detailed journal is kept of the trip. The student and missionary must fill out evaluation forms. Reading assignments will be given dealing with mission boards, deputation, cultures, etc.

Speech

SP 102-Principles of Speech 3 hours

A practical study giving the basic principles of public speaking with special emphasis on pulpit and platform technique. Voice quality and platform manner are stressed. Ample practice in delivering various types of speeches are included.

Electives

EL 101-Holy Spirit and Charismatic Movement 2 hours

This is a study that exposes the fallacy of the charismatic movement. The first section deals with some basic doctrines of the Holy Spirit as they relate to this movement. The second section deals with the movement itself and many of its misconceptions. The final

part of the course deals in detail with speaking in tongues.

EL 102-Creationism

2 hours

A course of study based upon a video series from Answers in Genesis by Ken Ham. Research and other reading is required. A literal, six-day creation approach is assumed. Many falsehoods of evolution are exposed. The basic philosophy that the world accepts is also examined to help the student to understand the mind of the secular world and why they reject what we believe. There is an emphasis upon the first chapters of Genesis.

EL 201-The Challenge of Missions

2 hours

This course goes beyond our introduction of Missions. It deals with some of the difficulties a missionary faces: different cultures and customs; ecumenicalism, world religions and cults on the field, interpersonal problems in the family, missionary team, the board, and the nations, thus emphasizing the need for a strong local home church.

EL 301-The Preacher and the Computer

2 hours

This course will examine how a computer can aid the preacher in his ministry and aid the local church. A Bible study program is examined for the pastor's personal study, desktop publishing, bulletins, flyers, etc. This class is taught in a computer lab.

EL 401-Techniques in Counseling

3 hours

This course follows the nouthetic approach. It examines the sufficiency of the Scriptures and of Christ in the lives of people. It takes a biblical approach to sanctification. The principles of "putting off and putting on" is stressed. The counselor will learn how to assign homework to help the counselee at home. The course is concluded with scenarios the preacher often faces in counseling.

EL 402-The Local Church and the Youth Pastor

2 hours

This course will look at the function and duties of the typical Youth Pastor in our fundamental local churches. The relationship to the Pastor, the philosophy of youth work, the challenges of the youth ministry, and the practical week-to-week operation of an effective youth ministry will be stressed in this course.

Missions Course Descriptions

MI 101—Introduction to Missions

2 hours

This course gives an overview of the New Testament principle of missions as seen in the Book of Acts and Church Epistles. The course examines how these principles are applied and practiced in the church's missionary endeavor today. The student will be given a biblical basis for the development of a strategy for world-evangelism through the local church. The indigenous principle is taught.

MI 301— Missiology 3 hours

This course is a continuation of Introduction to Missions. The course will examine the history of missions with an emphasis on the great modern missionary movements up to today. An emphasis will be placed on the principle of indigenous church planting.

MI 302— Missionary Evangelism 2 hours

This course will examine the difficulties of cross cultural evangelism and discipleship. The student will be practically equipped to effectively share the gospel, disciple new converts and mentor leaders in varying cultures. The dangers of ecumenicalism will also be discussed.

MI 401— Practical Missionary Training 3 hours

This course will prepare the missionary for his pre-field ministry of deputation. It will emphasize missionary ethics and relationships, the mission board, presentation of his ministry in the local church, finances, visas, insurance, and retirement as well as other issues pertinent to missionaries prior to leaving for the field.

MI 402— The Life of the Missionary 3 hours

This course will prepare the missionary for life on the field. It will deal with the many difficulties the missionary will face while living in a different culture. An emphasis will be placed on the challenges of adapting to a different culture, customs and language's that will be encountered. Family issues will be considered and prepared for.

MI 403—Missionary Internship 2 hours
(formerly MI 401 Missions Practicum)

The student will be expected to complete a missionary internship under the supervision of an experienced missionary. A ten day minimum trip to the mission field is required. A detailed journal is to be kept by the student outlining the various opportunities for ministry, interpersonal relationships on the field, lessons learned, as well as problems that we encountered. The student will be

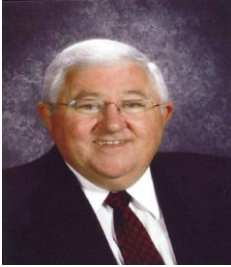
CE 404 – Youth Internship

3 hours

Designed to provide as much hands-on-experience as possible, this course is to be taken for a semester during the last two years of college under the supervision of the youth pastor of Calvary Baptist Church. He will be given a checklist of experiences including counseling, soul-winning, discipling, visitation, preaching, teaching, planning and directing youth activities, including VBS, camp, retreats, etc. He will work closely with the youth pastor for a minimum of 5 hours per week for the duration of the semester.

The Church

The Church

The church is the plan of God for this age. We, at Calvary Baptist Bible College, are local church minded. Christ loved the church and gave Himself for it. We too love the church and are training men to minister through fundamental, independent, local Baptist churches across our country and around the world. The following is a brief outline by Dr. Roger Baker.

The Nature of the Church (Matt. 16:18)

The church is built upon a sure foundation (1 Cor. 3:11; Eph. 2:20) “upon this rock...” The church is built upon the rock (petra) Christ Jesus. No other foundation can be laid than that which is already laid—Jesus Christ. He is called the chief cornerstone. Everything is to be in alignment with Him. All measurements and comparisons are to be taken from Him—the Standard.

The church is a structure that is being built (1 Peter 2:5) “...I will build...”. The building of Christ’s church is a process. When God was ready for His created world, He spoke and there was. Today our Lord is building His church through the teaching and preaching of the Gospel of Christ. There is absolutely no substitute for good Bible preaching in the building of the church. Again, the Word of God is the instrument. Living stones are being added to the temple. We have the privilege and joy of being co-laborers with God in this matter.

The church is a secure institution (organism) “the gates of hell shall not prevail”...The church is as secure as the promises of God! Amen! Things may not look good at times for the church. People may lose confidence in it. Others may want to replace it, but God has no other plan for this age. God will keep His promise. The church rests upon the foundation of Christ Himself.

The Necessity of the Church

The church is vital to the plan of God for this age, and necessary for the Savior to be exalted (Eph.3:21). Christ is the Head of the church. He is to have the preeminence. Worship is certainly one of the great purposes of Christ's church (John 4:24). We must build Christ-centered churches, worshipping Him through our praise, preaching, praying, giving, singing, and obedience.

The church is necessary for the saints to be edified (Eph. 4:12). God desires to see His church "built-up" in the faith. This is one reason for the necessity of doctrinal preaching. Our churches must be grounded upon the Word of God. It must be our rule of faith and practice. Our church should be an oasis in the midst of this world, where God's people come to fellowship and share their lives one with another around our Lord Jesus. Corporate prayer, singing, Bible preaching and teaching, fellowship, and ministry are such a vital need today.

The church is necessary for sinners to be evangelized (Acts 2:47) Some say the church cannot save. This is true, but our Lord's church has the message that will save! What a need today to reach out in our communities and around the world to the lost that are dying without God and without hope. The Great Commission is repeated in Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, and Acts. Some of the last words of our Lord before His ascension concerned the responsibility of the church to preach the Gospel, make disciples, baptize converts and teach them the Word of God. The need is great. Every biblical method must be used.

Personal testimony, evangelistic services, visitation programs, bus ministries, jail ministries, rest home ministries, revival services and missions conferences are effective.

The Neglect of the Church

Many who call themselves Christians neglect the church. Certainly, we should love what our Lord loves. We have a responsibility to be faithful to His church. (I Cor. 4:2)

We must be faithful with our time. Hebrews 10:25 exhorts us to be faithful in our gathering together. It is so important for a Christian to give time to regular church attendance. A wise Christian will invest a portion of his or her time in ministry through the local church.

We must be faithful with our talents. God has blessed every Christian with spiritual gifts and natural abilities (1 Cor.. 12:7). What a privilege and opportunity to serve our blessed Lord Jesus. As we are faithful serving Him and using our talents for His glory, we will

have crowns to lay at His nail-pierced feet (Rev. 4:10). God help us to be involved in the various ministries of the church. We must be faithful with our treasures God has entrusted much to us. We are told to be faithful and wise stewards of the possession God has given to us to manage. A Christian should regularly support his local church with his tithes and offerings (Mal. 3; I Cor. 16; II Cor. 8-9). All we have is owed to the Lord's grace. No man has power to earn wealth except it is given to Him of the Lord (Deut. 8:18). No man would even have the breath or the health to work except for the graciousness of the Lord.

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We must be faithful with our testimony. We are His epistles, read of all men (II Cor. 3:2). People watch our lives and listen to our speech. Our testimony is of utmost importance to the cause of Christ. We should avoid anything that could bring reproach upon our Savior. We should live a life that brings honor to Christ and is an example of the believer. We should also have a testimony through our lips—sharing Christ, speaking words that edify. No corrupt communication should proceed from our lips. How important both life and lip are to our testimony!

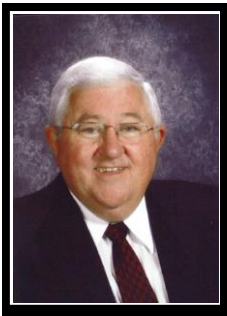

In an effort to provide quality training and to help enhance the professional skills of God-called men already engaged in the ministry, graduating


with a bachelor's degree or just wanting to further their education, we offer the Master of Ministry Degree.

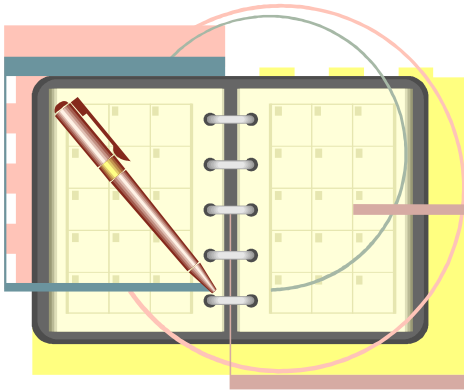

GENERAL INFORMATION

Distinctives

- We believe there is a great need for the training of fundamental, independent Baptist leaders for the next generation. Calvary is dedicated to this task. We will seek to exalt Jesus Christ rather than men or personalities.
- We are an independent Baptist seminary, not just “Baptistic”. Because of this we will not accept students from charismatic, non-denominational or inter-denominational churches.
- We emphasize the importance of the local church in God’s plan for the ages.
- We insure that the King James Bible is the only English-language Bible that will be used in our classrooms or chapels.

- We stress the importance of strong, sound, biblical preaching, since God has chosen the foolishness of preaching to confound the wise (1 Cor. 1:17-28).
- We will not be a part of the unbiblical ecumenicalism of today.

Notice of Non-Discrimination Policy

Calvary Baptist Bible College and Seminary admits students of any race, color, nationality and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the school. Calvary also does not discriminate in the administration of its policies and programs based upon race, color, nationality or ethnic origin.

A student's record is confidential. The release of information from a student's permanent record is governed by federal law. We will abide by the laws concerning privacy.

Students that need housing during the modular class week may call the office for availability. We have a limited number of homes available at no cost to the student. We will also provide the student with a list of local motels which will give a special rate to students who are attending the class.

Procedures for Admission

- Submit official transcripts from high school, your undergraduate degree institution and/or any graduate transcripts where credits were earned. You

may be asked to provide a catalog of the institution. If you have attended Calvary Baptist Bible College, your transcripts will be on file. Official transcripts should be sent directly to the Office of Admissions, Calvary Baptist Bible College and Seminary. Hand-delivered transcripts are not acceptable.

- North Carolina law requires that a current immunization record be on file in the school's office. These records are available to the student from previously attended schools, physician's offices, health departments or the military.
- A recent photograph should accompany the application.
- Submit two letters of reference by individuals who are qualified to evaluate the candidate's ministry experience and ministry potential. If the candidate is not a pastor, one of these letters must be his pastor. The phone numbers of these two references should be provided to the seminary office.
- Acknowledge your agreement or any disagreements with the doctrinal statement found in the college catalog. If there are questions concerning the doctrinal statement, please make note of these on the application.
- A short written testimony should also accompany the application. This testimony should include your conversion and your call and/or goals for the future and how Calvary relates to these objectives.

Requirements

- If applying to be a candidate for graduation, a bachelor's degree from a recognized institution is required. Any questions concerning this should be directed to the seminary administration.
- We will allow men who do not have an undergraduate degree to audit the courses as non-credited courses.
- Calvary recognizes that throughout Scripture and church history, God has used both men and women to achieve great things, however, it is the doctrinal conviction of this school that only men are called to be preachers (1 Timothy 3). Since our purpose in the graduate program is primarily to train men for the Gospel ministry, we do not allow ladies to enroll in the graduate school.

Transfer of Credits

- Calvary Baptist Seminary reserves the right to reject transfer credits from any academic institution at the discretion of the administration.
- Credits will only be accepted from an approved institution, and the course grade must be a C or higher.
- Courses that are transferred must be of comparable content and quality as those offered at Calvary Baptist Seminary. Courses of comparable quality, but not content, may be accepted as elective credits. Elective credits will be limited to the number required for graduation.
- Transferred credits will be reviewed and the student notified as soon as possible of acceptance.

Transcripts

- Students coming from other schools must have all transcripts sent directly to Calvary.
- A form is enclosed in the application packet for requesting transcripts.

Accreditation

- It is not the intent of Calvary Baptist Bible College and Seminary to seek secular or Christian accreditation for its programs of study.
- We choose not to submit our college to standards of men who are not of like faith and practice.
- Students should be aware that federally sanctioned accreditation often leads to regulations upon institutions through government appointed agencies.
- Accreditation is not a guarantee of quality in education. It is the duty of God's people to be guided by Scripture and integrity to work and pray to have the very best in a quality education that pleases God.
- We do not see any biblical basis for accreditation.

State of North Carolina

Undergraduate and graduate programs of study offered at Calvary are exempt from the requirement of licensure by the University of North Carolina under provision of North Carolina General Statutes Section (G.S.) 116-15(d) for exemption from licensure with respect to religious education. Exemption for licensure is not based upon any assessment of program quality under established licensing standards.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

The cost of attending Calvary Baptist Seminary is very modest in comparison to many other similar schools. It is important that students make adequate preparation for the cost of their education. We seek to offer a reasonably priced graduate degree.

Fees and tuition expenses

- All fees and tuition are due at registration unless previous arrangements have been made. If there is a problem please call the seminary office. We will work

with you any way we can while maintaining the financial stability of our school.

- A returning student may not register for a new class until the account for the preceding class has been paid or special arrangements have been made with the seminary office. A diploma, final report card, or transcript will not be issued until all financial accounts at the seminary are paid in full.

Application Fee...(one time only) ...\$ 30 (degree only)
Registration Fee\$ 25 (degree only)
Tuition.....\$125 per credit hour
Auditing Fee (no credit)..... \$ 45 per credit hour

- Pre-payment incentive – Any student who pays the full amount of tuition and fees prior to the day class begins will receive a 10% discount on tuition (not fees and books). Payment must be received in the office by the Friday preceding the class start on Monday.

Refunds and Adjustments

- No fees will be refunded.
- Any student who withdraws before the class begins will receive a full refund of any tuition paid but will be required to pay the registration fee.
- If a student withdraws before the beginning of the second day of the module, 50% of the tuition will be refunded. After this, there will be no refunds given.

Refunds and Adjustments policy for those enrolled in a Veterans' Administration program

- The following refund policy will be applicable to persons enrolled under provisions of Title 38, U.S. Code, as amended. This institution maintains the following policy for refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees and other charges in the event the person fails to enter a course, withdraws, or is discontinued therefrom at any time prior to completion.
- The amount charged to the persons for tuition, fees and other charges for portion of the course will not exceed the approximate pro rata portion of the tuition, fees, and other charges that the length of the completed portion of the course bears to its total length.

Veterans Administration Information

We are approved by the Veterans' Administration as a college where qualifying veterans may receive their benefits. Veterans who wish to apply for benefits while in school should call our office and speak with John Morales or Mary Handy for information. All veterans attending classes must realize they are responsible for their payments to the school. We will work with the student to help them properly apply for and receive qualifying veteran's benefits.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

We offer a Master of Ministry (M.Min.) degree. Qualified men from all across America will teach our five-day modules. We will seek to have the very finest teachers in their respective fields teaching in our graduate school. The course modules will be offered in January and August of each year (see the seminary calendar details).

Calvary will also have a limited number of on-line courses to offer those enrolled in our program. We will allow a student to complete three (3) on-line classes from Calvary Baptist Seminary that will be applied to the required hours for the Master of Ministries degree.

The degree program of study offered by Calvary Baptist Bible College and Seminary has been found to be exempt from the requirements of licensure by the University of North Carolina under provisions of North Carolina General Statutes Section (G.S.) 116-15 (d) for exemption from licensure with respect to religious education. Exemption for licensure is not based upon any assessment of program quality under established licensing standards.

Requirements for Graduation

- A minimum of 32 approved graduate credit hours will be required in order to obtain a graduate degree from Calvary.
- Candidates for a graduate degree must complete a minimum of 24 graduate credits at Calvary. Eight (8) credit hours of completed work may be transferred from an approved graduate school. A transcript evaluation will be made.
- A graduate student may take as many as 6 credit hours on-line from Calvary.
- All candidates for the graduate degree will be required to write a thesis on an approved topic before graduation. This thesis will count as 2 credit hours toward the graduate degree. See course descriptions for details.
- In order to participate in graduation, all course work must be completed satisfactorily and all accounts paid in full by graduation day.
- The student must sign a written agreement concerning the college's statement of faith.
- The student must adhere to Biblical standards and ethics in living one's lifestyle.

Academic Records

- Complete records for each student are maintained by the office and include the following:
 - Application
 - Reference responses
 - Credit earned from courses taken at Calvary
 - Credit given for work completed for previous education
 - A final grade for each course taken
 - A record of all withdrawals including the last date of attendance
- After each module class, students will be provided the following:
 - A class report card at the end of each module within 30 days after the final date for completion of any projects assigned by the professor.
 - A progress report which shows the student's progress toward graduation (for those who are enrolled in the graduate program).

Academic Counseling

The sixth edition of MLA (Modern Language Association) with a slight modification (title page required, etc.) is standard. This will be the style expected for all research papers turned in at Calvary. A teacher may require something different but will explain it to you.

PROGRAM OF STUDY

Calvary Baptist Seminary offers the Master of Ministries graduate degree. The Master of Ministries degree is offered in module form with each one week module counting as (2) credit hours.

Since the seminary uses the modular class approach, the availability of classes will vary. The seminary also reserves the right to cancel any course that does not have sufficient enrollment to warrant the offering of that particular class, although we do not foresee this happening.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSES

Bible

BI 501 The Book of Romans (*2 credit hours*)

One of the greatest doctrinal books in all of the Bible will be explored and broken apart by rightly dividing the Word of God. The value and practicality of doctrine in the local church will be emphasized. Emphasis will be given on how to preach through this important book. A notebook will be developed for future use in teaching Romans to the people involved in your ministry.

BI 502 The Biblical Text Issue (*2 credit hours*)

This course will endeavor to explore the biblical and historical definition of the preservation of the Scriptures. The manuscript issues will be discussed. A brief history of the English Bible will be included. There are many questions that believers and nonbelievers alike have concerning the reliability of the Bible.

BI 503 – Dispensationalism: The importance of proper interpretation (*2 credit hours*)

This is a study of the biblical dispensations and their impact on the proper interpretation of the Bible. The history of premillennial dispensationalism will be briefly covered as well as a brief comparison of the covenant position. A more thorough consideration of covenant theology will be given in the course: Theological Trends that Affect the Local Church.

BI 504 – Apologetics: A defense of historical Christianity as stated in the Scriptures (2 credit hours)

How do we answer a society skeptical of Christianity? We are commanded to answer the questions of those who ask us why we believe what we believe. 1Peter 3:15 states, "But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear." Enemies of the gospel and their beliefs will be identified and answered. We will deal with practical areas of apologetics such as how to answer evolution, tolerance, humanism, postmodern thought, etc.

Church Education

CE 501 – Reaching and Teaching the Whole Family (2 credit hours)

This course will not be developed around how to build a Sunday School, but will include all educational ministries of the church that seek to evangelize and disciple the student and provide needed fellowship. Adults, teens, and children will be addressed. A notebook of practical helps will be developed during the course that the student may take home and implement in his own ministry.

CE 502 – Restoring the Sunday School (2 credit hours)

The Sunday school today is often the forgotten strategy of evangelism and discipleship. Practical instruction will be given on how to build quality as well as quantity in the Sunday School. The student will leave with a notebook of wealth to pray over and implement in his church. This course will be very practical and helpful in building a Sunday School.

Practical Theology

PT 501 The Dynamics of Biblical Preaching (2 credit hours)

The primary role of a preacher is to preach the Word of God. Understanding the dynamics of sermon building will better equip the man of God to preach practical truths, remaining true to the text of scripture. This class is designed to enhance both the expositional and homiletical skills of the preacher.

PT 502 – The Art of Pastoring (2 credit hours)

This course provides Bible exposition from the pastoral epistles along with the pastoral experience of the instructor to further equip men with the all important expertise needed to pastor a vibrant local Baptist church.

PT 503 – Biblical Church Growth (2 credit hours)

This course will explore the biblical model for church growth and is designed to equip the student with the vision and practical expertise necessary to have a growing ministry. We realize that churches grow in

different ways (not just numerically). The principles discussed in class are applicable to any size church in both rural and urban communities. It will be a very practical class. What is gleaned can be prayed over and used in the church from which the student comes. The student will leave with a notebook full of ideas he may implement or teach to his church family.

PT 504 – Biblical Counseling in the 21st Century
(2 credit hours)

Advance training in the counseling ministry in areas that are common today, such as marriage and family difficulties, immorality, addictions (pornography, drug, alcohol, etc.), anger, financial and youth struggles. You will learn the biblical model for restoring a fallen brother. You will develop a notebook that can serve as a source for you to follow as you deal with people when you return to your ministry.

PT 505 – Ethics in the Gospel Ministry (2 credit hours)

You will receive practical training in the areas of inter-personal and inter-ministry relationships. There is a right way to deal with men of God, whether they be missionaries, pastors, evangelists, the former pastor, or the pastor across town. There is also a biblical method to deal with people within the local church. Many good men lose their ministries because of an inability to deal with personal problems. We will search the Bible together to form a biblical model and also share years of experience.

PT 506 – Personal Life Management—Pastor and balanced life
(2 credit hours)

This class will seek to enrich and encourage the Christian soldier who is in the battle, to renew his vision and deal with managing his life. The use of our time, our family life, personal finances, investments for the future, and the need to care for our health and our spiritual walk with the Lord will be discussed. Goals and methods for achieving these goals will be presented in an honest, yet non-confrontational way. A practical notebook will be developed.

History

HI 502 – Our Baptist Heritage: Where do we fit in fundamentalism? (2 credit hours)

A history of Baptist churches in America and their influence on our nation will be stressed. This is one of the best kept secrets in American Christianity today. The Baptist church as it relates to fundamentalism and the influence of American revivals on Baptist churches will be examined. The distinctive that set us apart will be explored. The student will develop a notebook and will be able to teach this in his church.

Missions

MI 501 – Roles in Missions—The church, the pastor, the missionary, the mission board and the great commission

(2 credit hours)

Biblical teamwork and vision must be in operation in order to properly carry out the great commission. Various models and methods for accomplishing this will be examined. The biblical approach will be developed. Solutions to existing problems between pastors, missionaries and mission boards will be drawn from the Bible and classroom discussion. This course will enhance the work of God by developing the responsibility of each partner involved in missions.

MI 502 – Islam and the church of Jesus Christ

(2 credit hours)

An introductory course on Islam – its influence today, its strategies and its impact on the church. An overview of the life of Muhammad, the Qu’ran, the doctrines of Islam, Islamic fundamentalism, the main sects of Islam and the church today in relation to Islam. The church is dealing with Islam all over the world today. You will develop a notebook of information that your church needs, which you may teach or use in your ministry.

Music

MU 501 – Church Music in the 21st century *(2 credit hours)*

The popular trends in music will be discussed – pros and cons. A biblical philosophy of music will be explored. Practical instructions will be given to the student concerning set up and administration of the total music program of a local church of any size. A notebook of practical suggestions and helps will be developed during the course that can be utilized by the student when he returns to his ministry. Free samples of choir music and special music will be given each student from publishers along with good sources for God honoring music.

Theology

TH 501 Theological Trends that affect the Local church

(2 credit hours) Theological trends in our world today. A study of current trends in theology including an investigation into the leaders of such trends, the thinking behind them, and the results of these movements.

Subjects likely to be included would be covenant theology, progressive dispensationalism, the marketing of the church and the contemporary movement that accompanies this, Calvinism, annihilation, success theology, and others contemporary to the time the course is offered.

General Education

GE 501 Research and Writing (2 credit hours)

Each student will be required to write a thesis of no less than 50 pages and no more than 80 pages in length following a slightly modified MLA format. This class will be taken *on-line* and will instruct the student in research methods, arranging material in logical order, writing skills, and format issues. This course will guide the student through the thesis writing process.

GE 502 Thesis (GE501 is a prerequisite) (2 credit hours)

The student will research and write a thesis on an approved topic. This paper will follow a slightly modified MLA method and will be explained in the on-line class "Research and Writing – GE501." The paper will be a minimum of 50 pages and a maximum of 80 pages. No student will be allowed to graduate who has not satisfactorily completed the thesis. A faculty member will be assigned to each student depending on the area of their research. Periodic meetings with the faculty member may be required. The faculty member will furnish the student his phone number and e-mail address for communication between student and teacher. This is basically a directive study project.

ADMINISTRATION

Pastor Kevin Broyhill – President

Kevin Broyhill became Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in March 2008 after serving as Associate Pastor from March 2006 to March 2008. He came to know the Lord as his Savior at the age of 17 and was called to preach the Gospel a year later. Pastor Broyhill studied at Piedmont Bible College in Winston-Salem, NC, and graduated with a Bachelor of Theology degree in 1994 from Calvary Baptist Bible College in King, NC. Prior to His coming to Calvary Baptist Church he served as Pastor of Temple Baptist Church in Lenoir, NC, for 16 years. Pastor Broyhill and his wife, Lori, have two children, Emily and James.

Dr. Roger Baker Vice President/Administrator

Administrative Assistant

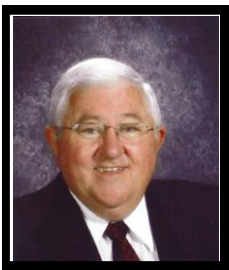
